## Dennis J. Starr (1946-1998) Collection

### Biography

Dennis James Starr was born on October 27, 1946 in Trenton, New Jersey to Raymond Starr and Lucy Bendetti Starr. In 1966, he received an AA degree from Trenton Junior College (the precursor to Mercer County Community College) and a BA in history from Rider College in 1968. He continued his education at Rutgers University, obtaining a master's degree in history in 1970 and a PhD in history in 1979.

Except for a short time spent in New Mexico and North Dakota, Starr's home was in Trenton. From 1970 to 1973, he served as a Teaching Assistant in Rutgers University's History Department while studying for his doctorate there. In 1975, he began his teaching affiliation with Rider College, beginning as an adjunct instructor and finally becoming an adjunct Associate Professor in 1993 where he taught until his death in 1998.

He had diverse research interests in local and regional history as well as labor and immigration. These interests are reflected in his academic papers and projects. His 1979 dissertation, "The Nature and Uses of Economic, Political and Social Power in Trenton, NJ, 1890-1917," used Trenton as a way of exploring the changing relationships between the upper class who ran the city and the working class whose labor they depended on. A continued interest in this theme is shown in a variety of papers and projects he was involved in that centered on the John A. Roebling's Sons Company, including the "Roebling Oral History Project" of 1993. Also, a 1995 paper "Anatomy of a City: The Economic and Social History of Trenton, New Jersey since 1960" traces the rise and fall of Trenton as an industrial and commercial success to a poor and ailing city. This paper was the center piece of a 1995 Trenton Human Relations Commission program titled "Trenton: We've Come Too Far: Race, Class, and Ethnicity – How Alike, Different or Both?"

Starr's interest in his Italian heritage can also be seen through his academic writings and a variety of projects. Chief among these was the publication of *The Italians of New Jersey: A Historical Introduction and Bibliography* in 1985. In addition, over several years he collaborated with Louis Presti of the New

Jersey Network (NJN) in raising funds and developing a project that resulted in *La Festa* a television documentary about Italian-American saints festivals in New York and New Jersey, produced by NJN, 1996. His scholarship also provided resources in the further study of Trenton in his “History of Ethnic and Racial Groups in Trenton, New Jersey, 1900-1960,” in which he provides an abstract on events pertaining to ethnic and racial groups in Trenton as found in the newspapers of the day.

In addition to teaching, he was affiliated with several organizations including the Central Jersey Chapter of American Italian Historical Association, the Trenton Human Relations Commission, and the New Jersey Historical Commission to which he was appointed as a Commissioner in May of 1992. He was also active in the successful campaign to block the building of an incinerator on Duck Island just outside of Trenton.

In the summer of 1997, Starr was diagnosed with liver cancer and despite aggressive treatment, he succumbed to the disease on December 18, 1998 at the age of 52. Writing of him in the *Rider News*, Dr. Roderick McDonald described Starr as a “dedicated teacher, accomplished scholar and community activist” who was “immensely proud of his native city of Trenton.”

### **Scope and Contents Notes**

The collection includes some examples of Dr. Starr’s writings, grant applications to projects he was affiliated with, and material documenting his teaching career including correspondence, course syllabi, two student papers and his application for promotion at Rider College. There are also some miscellaneous materials related to his graduate education (grades, correspondence, etc.), some scattered personal correspondence and one photograph of him. Finally, there is a collection of academic papers dealing with immigration that were accumulated by Dr. Starr. The collection spans from 1969 to 1999 and consists of 3 boxes of material.

### **Series Description**

#### **Series 1. Biographical Information, ca. 1978-1999**

This series consists of copies of Starr’s curriculum vitae (academic resume), the one picture of him in the collection and copies of his obituaries.

#### **Series 2. Academic Papers and Projects, 1971-1994**

This series consist of a few academic papers as well as project-related files which are arranged below in chronological order. Most notably, this includes research note cards, drafts, partial drafts and what appears to be a complete draft of his dissertation, “The Nature and Uses of Economic, Political and Social Power in Trenton, New Jersey, 1890-1917.” There are also complete copies of his “History of Ethnic and Racial Groups in Trenton, New Jersey, 1900-1960,” and “Anatomy of a City: The Economic and Social History of Trenton, New Jersey Since 1960.” The most extensively detailed project in the series is on *La Festa* a television documentary about Italian-American saints’ festivals in New York and New Jersey, produced by New Jersey Network, 1996. The last item in this series [Box 2, Folder 10] is an incomplete paper on John Roebling that includes no title or author but might be the product of Dr. Starr’s research given his interest in the subject.

#### **Series 3. Teaching Career and Affiliations, 1969-1992**

This series consist of correspondence regarding seeking teaching positions, two student papers, syllabi from his courses and his application for promotion at Rider College. Also included are some materials from the Central Jersey Chapter of the American Italian Historical Association, for which

he served as president and the New Jersey Historical Commission including his commission from Gov. Florio.

#### **Series 4. Miscellaneous, 1968-1991**

This includes some documents related to his graduate studies, miscellaneous correspondence and a few newspaper articles.

#### **Series 5. Collected Papers on Immigration, 1982-1987**

This consists of a collection of academic papers on immigration centering on the experience of immigrants to New Jersey found with Dr. Starr's papers.

### Provenance

The bulk of this collection was donated by Dr. Starr’s sister, Jane Starr Stanley in January of 1999. Materials from the project titled “History of Ethnic and Racial Groups in Trenton was donated by the New Jersey Council on the Humanities in 2016 and accessioned as 2016.10.

### Processing Notes

During the processing of this collection, exact duplicates and drafts of materials that only included minor corrections (grammar, punctuations, spelling etc.) have not been retained. Incidental financial records (cancelled checks, pay stubs) were also not retained. The research note cards in Series 2 were found, for the most part, in no discernible order. They have been grouped into small bundles by cotton tying tape; the few that were found rubber banded or clipped together have been kept as a group and a note added to indicate they were found as such.
